Showcasing Successful Academic Detailing Evaluation: Practicing with HIV PrEP Case Studies

CASE STUDY #1

- Your team is planning to start an AD intervention to increase PrEP prescribing in your jurisdiction.
- Your supervisor tells you that you need to complete an evaluation of your intervention and present the findings to the Leadership Committee once the project is complete.
- You're put in charge of managing the evaluation process and want to get started on evaluation planning right away.

CASE STUDY #2

- Your team successfully completed your first AD intervention and increased PrEP prescriptions in your jurisdiction by 5%, but the increase in PrEP prescriptions happened unevenly across different parts of the jurisdiction.
- The Leadership Committee decides that they'd like your team to implement another AD intervention that focuses on improving clinician stigma related to HIV prevention and care.
- You're once again in charge of managing the evaluation process knowing how helpful it was to start planning for your evaluation early, you decide to take that approach again.

BIG PICTURE QUESTIONS TO ASK DURING YOUR EVALUATION

- Number of clinicians reached in a geographical area.
- Knowledge of resources in the area/
- Social determinants
- Where can they refer out to?
- Is there openness of discussion?
 - o e.g., knowledge gap, potential bias, stigma, etc.
- Can they share stats on consistency of care?
 - o e.g., scheduled visits, no gaps in medication therapy, etc.
- Understanding the prework required what's your area?
- What's your goal?
- What follow-up questions might arise?
- Where is the gap?
 - o e.g., education, taking sexual health history, etc.
- Are appointments decreasing stigma/shame/embarrassment/barriers to patient interaction?

EXAMPLES OF SPECIFIC QUESTIONS TO ASK DURING YOUR EVALUATION

- Understanding of demographic for HIV PrEP
- Is PrEP already being prescribed?
- Number of prescriptions before and after visits?
- How often is screening happening for those eligible for PrEP?
 - o e.g., yearly sexual health screening for all individuals
- Do clinicians understand definitions which contribute to sexual health and how to ask accessible questions?
- Are labs (titers) being ordered when indicated?
- Can we access Current Procedural Terminology (CPT) codes?
 - o e.g., charging for it, diagnosis codes, etc.
